"CULTURAL HERITAGE - CONTEMPORARY CHALLENGE"

First Call

Why should we complicate our life by preserving historic monuments?

May be we should look only to the future, where the new is replacing the old? What is better – the new or the old? Anything that is new - is it also good?

Is cultural diversity of any relevance in a period of financial crisis?

How do we preserve cultural heritage for a multicultural society? Will environmental accounts in most cases indicate that rehabilitation of existing buildings have greater environmental impact than demolishing and building new ones?

Is authenticity really an important cultural historical quality? Is it important for everyone/anyone? Does it constitute a value in the market/economy?

What brings 'added value' to the heritage, from the perspective of different actors? How do heritage professionals understand the benefits of preservation, and how do other stakeholders see the potential of heritage, at the level of local and regional development?

How do we achieve common goals in areas where our opinions do not match?

What?

The Forum "Cultural heritage – contemporary challenge" will address the preservation of cultural heritage today as a challenge for different actors involved in this field and will highlight the challenges that every cultural heritage preserver may have in the Baltic Sea region. The anticipated result of the event is to define the risks which can lead to irretrievable loss of heritage values.

During The Forum there will be panel discussions to exchange experience based on regional issues.

Four target areas have been selected for a thorough analysis. These are:

Environmental impact assessment of historic buildings

Restoration of cultural heritage and authenticity

Cultural heritage and contemporary architecture

Cultural heritage as a public good and an asset in local and regional development

Why?

Cultural heritage is confronted with many challenges: environmental, economic, and multicultural. The aim of the Forum is to discuss these challenges in detail, in order to know what to expect and to find good solutions.

Who?

The Forum is open to everybody in the Baltic Sea region interested in cultural heritage. The Forum offers a unique opportunity to meet colleagues from neighbouring countries, who share the same challenges and views. There will be good opportunities for networking and exchange of experience among stakeholders in our region.

More specifically, the target group will consist of heritage and planning professionals, owners and managers of cultural heritage property within Baltic Sea States, architects, landscape architects, building engineers, developers, economists, construction companies, researchers, universities, representatives from the professional associations, educational institutions, heritage administrators, local/regional authorities and NGOs, state bodies responsible for cultural heritage, representatives from museums and sites, politicians and other interested stakeholders.

Participation is free of charge. All other expenses (travel, accommodation, per diem, local transport) are covered by participants

Accommodation

Accommodation will be proposed in the Second Call, all within the city centre, from two star hotel (approx. 40-60 euro per night, breakfast included) to four star hotel (approx. 100-150 euro per night).

Joint activities focus on sharing experiences and good practices, harmonizing heritage protection standards and management policies in the region. Networking aims at feeding awareness of cultural heritage aspects to other sectors and to the broader regional and even international policy making.

The wide sphere of cultural heritage forms a linking element, common concern and a remarkable potential for regional assets. Thus, during the reconnection of the region in the 1990'ies, the Monitoring Group was appointed by the respective Ministers of Culture in the framework of regional cooperation under the umbrella of the Council of the Baltic Sea States.
